She pushed to invest in North Carolina's schools so our students are the best educated anywhere. In Washington, she will fight for change with middle class tax cuts, a new energy policy and more affordable health care. But Elizabeth Dole and the rest of Washington are doing the opposite-giving huge tax breaks to big oil companies while gas costs four dollars a gallon. They passed a prescription drug law that gives billions to drug companies while prices for seniors keep going up. Hagan believes a change in direction means a change in Senator, so our families come first for a change.

Elizabeth Dole, the Republican, is running for re-election in the Senate to continue to work to strengthen our economy and keep taxes low. Dole will continue to support middle class tax cuts that allow people to keep more of the money they earn and streamline unnecessary regulations that limit small businesses' ability to grow. Dole introduced legislation to help North Carolina tobacco farmers compete in the world market, fought to keep open North Carolina's military bases, and worked with North Carolina sheriffs to deport illegal immigrants who have committed crimes. But Kay Hagan is a Democrat who will vote to raise taxes on middle class families, and will be part of the Democratic party that supports homosexual marriage and amnesty for illegal immigrants. Dole will continue to represent North Carolina values in the Senate, and work for changes that will move the country in the right direction.
